NORTH AFRICA AND THE MIDDLE EAST

Fieldwork to improve knowledge of the status and distribution of selected plant species and habitats that defines IPAs is taking place in Morocco, Algeria, Tunisia, Egypt, Palestine and Lebanon.

Each country had selected several endemic and threatened species that require a study of their conservation status and distribution. This diagnosis is the basis to establish conservation actions.

All the field work teams follow a common methodology that was established during the "Species field data collection workshop" that was hold at Rabat and Maamora Forest (Morocco) between 22 - 26 March 2015. This methodology is available at IPAS-MED Project Documentation Platform http://www.uicnmed.org/projects/documentationplatform/68

The mapping unit is a kilometer square (1x1 km). The taxa selected for field inventories are sought systematically within the perimeter of each of the IPA, in areas where there are habitats that could support them. Data on other rare taxa observed during field research are also collected.

The IPA online database

Seona has begun the process of entering the IPA questionnaire data from the 2007 to 2010 reports in North Africa and the Eastern Mediterranean. She is planning to contact all the coordinators in the next two months to tell them more about the database and to create logins so that national coordinators can edit and enter their own data. She is also making sure that all the data sharing agreements are in place.

Plantlife is planning a major overhaul of the database within the next year to make it easier to hold image files, to use difference scripts, and to make it easier for public browsing and querying.

UNEP WCMC have recently asked for permission to use basic IPA shape and qualifying feature data to use in their map of critical habitats as a 'first look' of sites to be avoided or investigated further in any proposed planning. This map would be published in a peer reviewed journal and they hope to create a dynamic online map in the future. We hope that many more individuals and organisations will use the data from IPAs when they are considering conservation and planning priorities.

Funding

We are enormously grateful to the MAVA Foundation and the Ernest Kleinwort Foundation for supporting the current phase of the Natural Networks Project. A key task for IUCN and Plantlife is to identify and apply for further funding to support and expand the current project. As possible funders are identified, we will be in touch with partners to discuss how we might proceed with grant applications. Should partners spot potential funding opportunities, including, for example, local businesses, do please pursue these and ask for help from IUCN and Plantlife.
